#### A message from the Foundation Chairman continued...

In these current times, more families than ever need some form of financial assistance with tuition fees. Our means-tested scholarship program continues to grow; yet not everyone who turns to us for assistance can be supported.

In 2022, your support of the Newington Foundation enabled the College to award a full or partial means-tested scholarship to 57 boys. As a result, the Foundation granted \$852,094 to support these students in our community who would otherwise never have dreamed that it was possible to attend our great school.

A bequest, received from the Estate of the Late William Carter (ON 1950), enabled our Board to allocate more funds to build our endowment for future generations of Newington scholars.

In 2022, we also warmly welcomed both Pam and Ken Brown (ON 1970) into the Founders' Society. Pam and Ken shared with us that they have generously included a gift to Newington in their wills.

Our inaugural Newington Giving Day, held on the eighth day of the eighth month – to celebrate the 48th anniversary of the establishment of our Foundation – was an amazing success. Our Newington family achieved the ambitious goal of raising \$308,888 in 24 hours that is now at work supporting eight boys on means-tested scholarships. I wish to express my sincere thanks to Jaydon, Jake, Will and their respective families, together with Justin Bosilkovski (ON 2005), for agreeing to share some of their journey through Newington as scholarship recipients. You can read more about this initiative on pages 22-23.

Several other initiatives, supported by our donors during 2022 included:

- The Chris Wild (ON 1991) Indigenous Scholarship, funded through the generosity of our community, has enabled us to grow from two Indigenous scholars in 2019 to four scholars in 2022, with a further scholarship awarded for an Indigenous student to join our Newington family in 2023; and
- An amazing community response to the devasting volcanic eruption and tsunami in Tonga that enabled our Foundation to provide much needed equipment and other resources to Tupou College as they begin the rebuilding process.

Our donors are helping to build a more inclusive Newington family environment for our students; they are supporting projects that are innovating Newington's education and culture; and they are supporting the best of buildings, programs and facilities. Our community is working together to ensure that our young adults graduate from Newington best prepared to achieve personal excellence, to make a positive contribution to society.

On behalf of the Foundation Board, thank you for sharing our belief that the future of our Newington family relies on the diversity of our community. Your gifts have made our work possible. Together, we will continue to work for and invest in an excellent, all-rounded education for the benefit of generations of Newington students.

Your support continues to provide the financial security, and therefore the sustainability of Newington College.

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# **About us**

Giving has been central to the evolution of Newington College since 1863. With the establishment of the Newington Foundation in 1974, many parents, Old Newingtonians, and friends of the College are continuing to provide gifts and endowments.

This generosity has shaped the College that we have today and paved the pathway for students who might otherwise not have had the chance to attend Newington. The foresight of donors has and continues to be transformational.

The governance of the Newington Foundation has changed several times over the last 49 years. In order to best support the long-term impact of giving at Newington, it was decided by College Council that the Foundation should be governed by an independent trustee.



The Newington Foundation Limited was established and incorporated as a Company Limited by Guarantee. From 1 January 2021, it became trustee of the Newington Foundation. It is exceptionally clear under our constitution that the beneficiaries of the Newington Foundation will only ever be Newington College and its students.


The Newington Foundation now leads the philanthropic and fundraising activity for the College and is responsible for ensuring that each gift is applied or endowed effectively and as intended by each benefactor. It also manages two key funds – the Scholarship Fund and the Building Fund.

The primary fundraising focus of the Newington Foundation is growing the capacity of the Foundation to enable the College's aspiration to increase the number of students supported by the means-tested scholarship program.

The College has communicated extensively with the Newington community in recent years about its aspiration to have 100 fully-funded means-tested scholarships available for boys of promise by 2040. The efforts of the Foundation are totally aligned with this.

The Newington Foundation is a registered charity with the Australian Charities & Non-profit Commission, it has been granted a Charitable Fundraising Authority by Fair Trading NSW, and is a deductible gift recipient as determined by the Australian Taxation Office. At the time of publication, the Newington Foundation held \$92 million in net assets, made up of funds allocated, based on donations and earnings, as below:



2022 was a challenging year for all investors, after grants to the College, the Foundation's investments increased by 2.13% on a rolling three-year average. When compared with the performance of the seasonally adjusted S&P/ASX200, down over 15% in 2022, the Foundation continued to demonstrate prudent financial management of gifts received from our Newington family.

# **Our rich**

# History of giving

#### 1863

#### **Newington College** founded at Silverwater

**Reverend Manton** canvassed the community for donations to help with the costs of renting and repairing Newington House. On the day of the official opening in July 1863, Rev Manton received over £200 in support of the fledging institution.



#### 1881

#### **Opening of Founders' Building**

A massive fundraising campaign was instituted to finance the relocation of the College from Silverwater to Stanmore, enabling the construction of the Founders' Building, led by a significant gift of £12,000 from Sir George Wigram Allen KCMG.







#### **1873**

#### **Stanmore Estate** acquired as a new home for Newington College

John Jones, a substantial landholder, owned approximately 23 acres in the suburb now known as Stanmore. Jones bequeathed the property to the Wesleyan Church. Following his death in 1848 and after some years of negotiation to acquire adjoining properties, the Jones Estate was transferred to the College in 1873.



#### First scholarship endowed

At the official opening of the Founders' Building, in 1881, the College announced that Mrs Schofield had given £1000 to inaugurate the first scholarship, now known as The Schofield Prize, awarded annually to the College Dux.







### The Wesleyan Methodists decided to investigate the feasibility of a college and in December 1861, Reverend John Manton was directed to canvass support in terms of financial donations.




#### 1930

#### Centenary Endowment Fund established

£3,000 raised by its founding members. "Stress was laid on the value of personal canvass in obtaining further support and every member present pledged ... to obtain at least one additional member within a few months"

# Means-tested scholarships formally established

The Foundation initiated the establishment of means-tested scholarships, funded by benefactors, and set itself a goal of raising enough funds by 2040 to endow 100 means-tested scholarships.

### Ongoing capital developments

Giving for 160 years, enabled the capital works programs at Stanmore, the Abbotsford Boatshed, Killara and then Lindfield campuses, and the acquisition of campuses on Cambridge Street and Concordia. The most recent significant development was the Taylor Sports Centre and the Rae Centre as part of the Sesqui-Centenary Appeal.

Six Old Newingtonians were entrusted with the establishment of The Newington Foundation to advance, preserve, develop and benefit Newington College by promoting the culture of giving.



### **Means-tested scholarships**

### Making an impact, child by child

Records show that students in financial need have been supported to attend Newington College since 1881. The first endowment was established in 1930, and contribued to the benefit of the College in many ways, before the the Newington Foundation formalised the provision of financial support and means-tested scholarships in 1974. It has progressively solicited for gifts and prudently managed the funds entrusted to it, for the benefit of generations of Newington students.

The Newington Foundation has a vital role to ensure that College remains accessible to as many children as our resources will allow; and in so doing supporting the College's diversity of students into the future.

All scholarships supported by the Newington Foundation are subject to a demonstrated financial need including full financial disclosures, as well as the child and family's commitment to our Newington ethos.

In addition to those means-tested scholarships supported by the Newington Foundation, the College itself also supports further means-tested scholarships as determined by the College Council.

A means-tested scholarship covers tuition or boarding fees for a student to attend Newington, who otherwise would not have the financial means to do so.

None of the Foundation's scholarships have academic or sporting-related criteria.

# **Chris Wild** (ON 1991) **Indigenous Scholarships**

Wild Scholarship recipients, Tallis (Year 11) and Bailey (Year 9), chat with Mark Morrison OAM, the College's Diversity Coordinator

Our most significant named scholarship was established in 2012 in honour and memory of Chris Wild (ON 1991). Chris, the son of the late Rob (ON 1964) and Mrs Jenny Wild, was a teacher with a passion for Indigenous education. Through the generosity of the Newington community, the 'Wild Scholarship' annually awards a fee-free, six-year Newington education to promising Indigenous boys.

#### Mark:

Tallis and Bailey, tell me a little bit about yourself.

#### **Tallis**

Hi, I've been here since Year 7. I'm now in Year 11. I come from Gulargambone. It's a small community and a small school, called Gulargambone Central School, which is a school from Kindergarten to Year 12. Growing up there I knew I wouldn't have had the best of opportunities to pursue my goals and dreams. So, I got the opportunity to come down here which I took with both hands.

#### Bailev:

Hi, I've been at Newington four years now, since Year 6. I started at Wyvern and it's been pretty good. It was a bit hard at the start to leave my mates from my old school. It was good once I got into it.

#### Mark:

Bailey, one of the things that you're proud of was improving in your own education and your own goals. Can you talk about that?

#### **Bailey:**

Yes. So in 2022 I did my first set of yearly exams and I passed. I'm really proud of that. It's made me happy. I guess I just did that through hard work, good teachers, just put my head down and decided to have a go.

#### Mark:

Well done! You're proud of yourself, I can tell, with that big smile. What does going to our friends at Redfern Jarjam College mean to you both? What's the benefit there?

#### **Bailey:**

One of the benefits is helping the kids, teaching them a bit more and it's good to be around them. I guess we were just teaching them, whatever they were learning that day – maths, cultural work, stuff like that, and that was good. It's good to help them and I also learnt myself. And I was passing on my own information to them.

#### **Tallis**

So I've started a new program, I think it was last year, where I work with Jarjams over in Redfern – a small school as well.



They want a good education; they're good workers, a tight group, and it's good to see. One of the young boys last year, he came over here, Year 7, and will start his high school journey at a nice school like this – it kind of reminds me of myself, really.

Mark:

Bailey, you've had lots and lots of successes. Let's talk about where you're heading now because of your results last year. What are you doing outside of school?

#### **Bailey:**

I've been doing athletics. I've got my national qualifiers for the 100 and 200 metres. I'm going to Brisbane for the Australian Schoolboys' titles. I'm hoping for a personal best; maybe a medal. It's been hard. Obviously, school [work] is my first priority, but I also love my athletics outside school. I've talked to some of the teachers to make plans so that they are compatible.

#### Mark:

What about you as a leader, now Talis? You're in Year 11 and you have taken it upon yourself to help some of the other boys around the place. Who are you looking out for?

#### Tallis:

Yeah, my goal is to kind of lead a few younger boys around, like Matari (Y7), Bailey, Ky-Mani (Y9), and a couple of the other boys. Especially I want to show Ky-Mani around a bit more as our families are close and know each other. He's in the boarding house and is living away from home. So, I've been around him a bit, but it would be good to lead Matari around a

bit before I leave next year. I suppose when I do leave I can still connect with him as much as possible and I already know that Bailey's asked me when I leave to come see him.

#### Mark:

Bailey, when you started, how many First Nations boys did you think you had with you at school?

#### **Bailey:**

Just the three of us. And I think Harrison [Marsh (ON 2021)] as well. Now we've got eleven people now. It's good to have more people to get along with. I guess it feels like we have a place in the school. We feel like we belong.

#### Mark:

Tallis, what about when you graduate? What are you thinking about university or social work? What has it been like in the boarding house? Be honest, because last year you didn't go home for six months, right?

#### Tallis:

Yeah, I suppose the boarding house is my second home. A good journey, starting at a young age it was good but the older I get, the more challenges you face, just with other stresses, work, mental health stuff as well, and homesickness kicks up a bit. It's good; I enjoy it at times; yet there's times when I get sick of it. Last year when I didn't go home for six months it kind of got to me a bit, but I just kept fighting through day by day.

## Reflection by Christian (Year 12)^



I am blessed for this opportunity at Newington College, provided to me by this scholarship.

I have taken the time to write this letter, to let you know about my time at Newington and I thought that this would be a great time since I am transitioning into Year 12, reflecting on my time at school.

The shift from my old school to Newington was rough at first. However, over time I have grown and adapted [to life at Newington], creating friends and moving into the boarding house.

The boarding house is a great environment and the culture is like a family of brothers. The house gives me structure to my daily life, allowing me to go to more training sessions and setting me up for academic success.

During 2022 I have been loving the sporting side of Newington, being involved in the 1<sup>St</sup> V and also being awarded Basketball Colours and becoming Captain of Basketball. I play small forward and can move through all positions on the court and I love the game. It has kept me grounded and has made me mature into the young man I am today, making the most out of every opportunity. When it is off-season, I play Australian Rules for the 1<sup>St</sup> XVIII and play ruck man on the team. It was a fun season and I found myself pretty good at the game, considering it was my first time playing.

I'm currently doing ten units in school, including Standard Maths, Advanced English, Earth and Environmental Studies, Visual Arts, and Business Studies. I enjoy both English and Maths, these two subjects being my best overall, whilst Science needs some work!

My social life at Newington is great. I try to get to know as many people as possible here and treat them respectfully.

I had my Year 12 retreat in Term 4. I felt really challenged to step outside my comfort zone. It helped me to listen to others and open up about myself and find out more about who I am – or want to be. This has stuck with me and I strive to have a good character and to bring life and energy to this world.

Overall, Newington College has been amazing – the friendships, education, facilities and sports have helped give me lots of opportunities in life that I would not have imagined had it not been for a Newington College scholarship.

Words are not enough to explain how much gratitude I have for this opportunity at Newington. I love this place!

# Named means-tested scholarships awarded in 2022

### Thank you to our benefactors

# The Phillip Davis OAM Mathematics Scholarship

This scholarship is named in honour of Mr Phillip Davis OAM to acknowledge his 90th birthday in 2014 and his 65 years of service to Newington in 2016. Phil Davis generously included a gift in his will to establish this scholarship as an enduring legacy to Mathematics for generations of Newington boys. An anonymous donor made a gift in support of the scholarship so that Phil could witness his gift in action during his lifetime.

# **The F Stretton Jeffs** (ON 1933) **Scholarship**

Created in 2016 through the generosity of Mr Rohan Jeffs (ON 1965) in honour and memory of his late father, F Stretton Jeffs (ON 1933), this scholarship offers a Newington education, for up to two years, to a student whose family would otherwise not have the financial capacity to attend the College.

#### The Eileen M Johnson Boarding Scholarship

Generously endowed by US-resident, Mr David Johnson (ON 1950) in honour of his late mother, this scholarship is awarded to boys from outside greater Sydney to assist with their fees at the Edmund Webb Boarding House. In 2022, four boys were supported via this scholarship.

# The King Family Scholarship

Created in 2021 through the incredible generosity of Mr Tony King (ON 1982), this scholarship offers one Newington College place, for up to six years, to a boy who excels creatively and who would otherwise not have the financial capacity to attend the College. This inaugural recipient was awarded the scholarship during 2022 and commenced in 2023.

#### The Ronald Lu (ON 1962) Art Scholarship

This unique scholarship, provided through the outstanding generosity of Mr Ronald Lu (ON 1963), provides annual grants to three talented senior students to attend intensive training at either the National Art School or the Julian Ashton School of Art. The scholarship also supports an artist-in-residence program for senior art students.

#### The Moffitt Family Scholarship

Established in 2016 through the generosity of Mr Philip Moffitt (ON 1982) and family, this scholarship offers, for up to six years, a Newington education to a student whose family would otherwise not have the financial capacity to have attended the College.

# **The Jean and Jim Millner** (ON 1937) **Scholarship**

This scholarship, established in 2017 through the extraordinary generosity of Mrs Jean Millner (since deceased), Mr Rob Millner (ON 1968) and family, offers, for up to four years each, a Newington education to two boys of Tongan heritage and whose families would otherwise not have the financial capacity to attend the College. The scholarship honours the outstanding service and leadership of Mr Jim Millner AM on the College Council and the support and encouragement of his wife, Jean.

#### The Mulford Scholarship

Celebrating the diversity of Newington College, this scholarship is named in honour of the immediate past Headmaster, Dr David Mulford, who retired in 2018 after leading the College for ten of its most successful years. In 2022, 13 boys from Years 7 to 12 were supported with full and partial scholarships. Without the support of The Mulford Scholarship, these boys would not have been able to access all that is offered via a Newington education.

# **The Robert Walter Storr** (ON 1938) **Music Scholarship**

Established in the late 1990s through a substantial bequest received from the Estate of the late Robert Storr (ON 1938), this scholarship assists boys from Indonesia, Malaysia or Singapore with music aspirations but who, through circumstances beyond their means, would be unable to attend Newington. This scholarship assists with tuition, music and boarding fees.

#### The Chris Wild (ON 1991) Indigenous Scholarship

Our most significant named scholarship was established in 2012 in honour and memory of Chris Wild (ON 1991). Chris, the son of the late Rob (ON 1964) and Mrs Jenny Wild, was a teacher and his passion was Indigenous education. Through the generosity of the Newington community, the 'Wild Scholarship' annually awards a fee-free, six-year Newington education to deserving Indigenous boys. In 2022, four Wild Indigenous Scholars were assisted with tuition fees.

On Monday 8 August 2022, we celebrated the 48<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the establishment of the Newington Foundation. Through the generous support of our community, \$308,888 was raised at the inaugural Newington Giving Day to support eight means-tested scholarships at Newington College.

Our means-tested scholarship program is built on the aspiration of giving students of promise the opportunity to attend Newington, which they otherwise would not have. With every gift matched, dollar for dollar, from the Old Newingtonians' Union, the Stanmore P&F Association and other leading benefactors, over 275 members of our community shared our belief and passion for means-tested scholarships.

Our community were invited to make gifts of \$58, \$108, \$258, and \$508 and responded with overwhelming support to achieve our goal of raising \$308,888 in just 24 hours.

Each of the 16 Houses at Stanmore, the four Houses at Wyvern, and the two Houses at Lindfield competed to raise the most funds, with Moulton House declared the winner. Additionally, students at all campuses were invited to make a gold coin donation, and students at Stanmore made a coin snake, with the winning house, Clunies Ross, achieving the longest snake.

A huge thank you to Will (Year 9), Jake (Year 11), Jaydon (ON 2022), Justin (ON 2005) and their families, for sharing their stories as part of this initiative.

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Opened in 2022 with the support of the Foundation's donors, the Aquatics & Rugby Change Rooms (ARC) provides students with specialised match-day and mid-week all-weather training facilities. The ARC comprises changing, coaching, and preparation areas for students' sports in the pool and on the Johnson Oval.

As part of the continued evolution of sport at Newington College, this enhanced facility and amenities were installed underneath the Spaceframe as part of an overhaul of the previous bathroom facilities and further excavation. The ARC is a best-in-class environment for students at all levels of athletic ability. With thanks to our benefactors, the facility provides all students with a learning and sports environment with an emphasis on swimming, water polo and rugby. The ARC comprises:

- Two new team changerooms for year-round usage
- Match preparation and warm-up spaces with bespoke technology
- Exceptional new amenities and personal lockers
- Direct pool access for matches, training and recovery
- Immersion with historic imagery and honour boards of Old Newingtonians

Opportunities are available for you to show your support for our sporting programs. A limited number of lockers are available that may be named in accordance with your wishes, such as in honour of a loved one, in recognition of an Old Newingtonian who may have made the ultimate sacrifice during war, in honour of past or present staff, or in tribute to a Newington sporting champion – living or past. Additionally, a Supporters Wall, with a limited number of 50 bricks are available.

### and Tupou College

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My family has a strong family connection with Tonga via my son-in-law, Ofa Fainga'anuku. Our buinsess has a 43-year history of organising tours for Newington (122 tours). As a result, we were able to harness the good will of the Balmoral Touch Football group.

With the opportunity to work with Newington staff and the College's relationship with Tupou College, all contributors had the confidence to be involved.

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- Ken Grover, Gullivers Sport Travel and dad of an Old Newingtonian The December 2021 eruption of the Hunga Tonga-Hunga Ha'apai volcano had a devastating and widespread impact on the Tongan people. Our Newington family rallied together in support of our Tongan brothers and their families as we raised nearly \$85,000 to support the purchase and installation of water filtration equipment and a 50kva generator, as well as the supply of a broad range of educational items.

For more than 150 years, Newington has been fortunate to have a storied and strong connection with the Kingdom of Tonga and our brother school, Tupou College. At the time, it was distressing and difficult to comprehend the tsunami disaster given limited communications. Many in our Newington community were very worried about how family members and our personal friends survived from day to day.

The 2022 Tongan Appeal was quickly launched to harness our community's support.

The supply of clean water was identified by emergency relief agencies as a pressing priority. Traditional water sources were likely to have been contaminated with volcanic ash and sea water. Our fundraising efforts targeted this rapidly emerging need.

Led by the outstanding support of the Balmoral Touch Rugby Association and Gullivers Sport Travel who collectively raised \$20,000, the Foundation helped to fund the purchase and installation of a generator and water filtration equipment – books were also supplied. The boys undertook several fundraising initiatives, supported by family members, teachers and friends and helped to raise more than \$3,500 towards agricultural supplies and the Newington Food Bowl at Tupou College.

These efforts were bolstered by a generous \$5,000 gift from Lodge Wyvern.

By donating educational, IT, catering, sport and music resources, the support of our community enabled the College to dispatch to Tupou College its 17<sup>th</sup> container in ten years – all in support of our brothers in Tonga, and their families.

# Gifts in memory of John Cull (ON 1969)

The Cull family's connection with Newington College dates from 1897. When John Cull passed away in 2022, his family and classmates came together to raise funds in his memory and to dedicate a bench overlooking Johnson Oval.

John Cull, from Gunnedah NSW, entered Wyvern House in Year 5 as a boarder. John's brother, Chris (ON 1965), was already at Newington and the boys were the third generation in the Cull family to attend Newington, following their father, Leonard (ON 1928) and grandfather, Fred (ON 1910).

Fred Cull was a generous benefactor and served for many years on the College Council. Fred funded a means-tested scholarship for a boy whose family could not afford a Newington education and he assisted the College to cover some of its debts. He was also the principal benefactor for Wyvern House in 1938, now known as the Le Couteur Centre.

John was passionate about Newington College and felt privileged to have the opportunity to attend the school his father and grandfather attended. He was active in all parts of College life. In his final year at Newington, John was Senior Prefect and Senior Boarding Prefect – one of very few students to have achieved such an honour. John served as Senior Cadet Under Officer, he was captain of the 2<sup>nd</sup> XV, rowed in the 1<sup>st</sup> IV and was awarded prizes for loyalty, service and citizenship.

He felt the need for students from rural and regional areas, particularly farming families who often suffer financial difficulties, to have the same opportunities as city students.

With the support of John's classmates from the year of 1969, led by the Honourable Robert Webster, Bob Miles, and John Snelgrove, together with John's family, over \$10,000 was raised to support the ongoing development of the College.

In a moving ceremony involving John's family, his classmates and Headmaster, Michael Parker, a bench overlooking Johnson Oval was dedicated in honour of John.

Newington has and continues to have a significant impact on the life of the Cull family.

The Board of the Newington Foundation extends its sincere thanks to Susan, John's wife, Sally and Andrew, their children, the extended Cull family and to John's classmates from the Year of 1969 for generously supporting this initiative. To honour John in this way is a privilege and a fitting tribute to John's love of Newington as well as the Cull family's commitment to the diversity of our College community, spanning generations.



Niel Burling (ON 1958) shares in his own words why he's included a gift to Newington in his will.

Some ten years ago I decided to recognise our family's longstanding connection with Newington, by way of a contribution to the Founders' Society.

I arrived at Stanmore in 1949 from a small school in western Sydney and the reason was simple. My cousin, Colin Hinrichsen (ON 1952), later to become a professor of dental surgery, was already there and it seemed like a good idea to my parents.

Walking into Wyvern House (now the Le Couteur Centre) with my mother was overwhelming and awe-inspiring! That first day, I met a small boy who sat next to me. His name is Guy Kingston (ON 1959). For some 75 years my friendship with Guy remained as though it was only a few years ago that we were at school together.

I fondly recall the memories of great masters like Bill Tongue (Master of Wyvern House from 1947 to 1965) and Don Brown (a teacher at Wyvern from 1950, then Master of Killara from 1957, and finally Master of Lindfield from 1967 to 1990).

The Main School came and went which were wonderful years, although academic achievement must have stopped with the other side of the family! I was honoured to be appointed a Prefect in my final year. I really loved my sport at Newington, beginning in the 11As at Wyvern and capped as a member of the 1st XV. I also enjoyed athletics from an early age through to my final years.

After I left the Millner Gates, the Newington Younger Set was one way of keeping engaged with College life. Terry Rolleston (ON 1953) was at the helm and ensured that there was lots of fun activities and the opportunity to meet new friends.

In 1963, I was one of the founding members of the Newington Old Boys (NOBs) Rugby Club and over the next ten years I met many more Old Newingtonians as they joined. It would be fair to say those relationships were cemented at a certain venue in Petersham!



# Today what continues to attract me to Newington is its diversity.

The 70s Club seemed to arrive very quickly and over our annual lunch at Newington, so many friendships are rekindled each year.

Pam and I (pictured left together) were pleased that two of our sons, Steven (ON 1987) and Mark (ON 1989), attended Newington and, whilst some things had changed in the 25 years since I was at school, the ethos of the school remained intact. I'm excited that Jack, my grandson, will hopefully commence in Year 7 at Newington in 2034 and I'm sure he will enjoy it as much as me.

At Newington, I value the way students from all walks of life and all socioeconomic backgrounds come together and help each other to be stronger and prepared for life's challenges.

The contribution made by our family, by becoming a member of the Founders' Society, is to support a means-tested scholarship. We want a young child to have all the benefits of a Newington education that might not have been available to him, were it not for our decision to provide for his future.

## Newington's Eungai Creek Campus

Empowered by the College's long-standing ethos of social service, the new Eungai Creek campus provides a launchpad for a mix of cultural, social, and outdoor experiences that will spark our students' growth so that they are prepared for life's challenges in order to make a positive contribution to our society.

The Newington Foundation joins the College in its aspiration for this exciting initiative as sustainable and reciprocally beneficial to students and the local community for generations of Newington students.
